
TRANSPORTATION Service Transportation

- Provided by organizations such as homeless shelters, youth development, job training, crime prevention, soup kitchens, recreation and sports, etc.
- Agencies may use their vehicles or purchase the services for their clients
- Eligibility is decided by the human services organization


UNIVERSITY Public Transportation

- (AKA mass transit) Services that provided by an agency that has been chosen to receive funds from the Federal Transit Administration of the United States Department of Transportation to serve the public
- Agencies sometimes are known as "designated recipients"
- Public transportation may be provided human service organizations, particularly in rural or small urban areas
- Also programs to improve both types of transportation and how the two can better serve the public

- Majority of programs and funding
- E.g., Medicaid, Social Services Block Grants, State
 Children's Health Insurance Program, etc.

SAFETEA- LU

- USDOT Surface Transportation Authorization
- Makes available funds to purchase vehicles, plan, and provide public transportation
 - Elderly Persons and Persons with Disabilities Program
 - Job Access and Reverse Commute
 - New Freedom
 - Nonurbanized Formula Grants
 - United We Ride (UWR)
 - Urbanized Formula Grants



- Federal agencies make funds available to
 States and local agencies
- States provide oversight
- Local agencies provide transportation services
 - Public
 - Transportation authorities, cities, counties, etc.
 - Private (for-profit and nonprofit)




Commission for the Transportation (CTD)

- Mission: to ensure the availability of efficient, cost-effective, and quality transportation services for transportation disadvantaged (TD) persons
- TD may include
 - persons with disabilities,
 - older persons, or
 - persons living in low-income households

CTCs & STPs by County




UNIVERSIFEDOT Public Transit Office

- Three sections

 - Transit Operations


Grant Administration and Commuter Assistance

- Statewide programs grant administration
 - (Nonurbanized or) rural and small urban program
 - Transportation for Elderly Persons and Persons with Disabilities
 - Statewide planning
- Commuter Assistance
 - Purpose: to provide travel choices to ensure mobility, sustain the quality of the environment, preserve community values and reduce energy consumption.

 Committee




